4. GJFC Origins & History

GREENSBOROUGH JUNIOR FOOTBALL CLUB INCORPORATED. Founded 1964

Affiliated Northern Football Netball League.

The origins of the Greensborough Junior Football Club are closely linked to the origins of junior football in the Diamond Valley area.

In 1966, Greensborough Football Club President and All-Australian footballer Joe Murphy, initiated the introduction of junior football to the Diamond Valley area. Two Greensborough under 15 teams, the Colts and the Rovers, played in the now disbanded Preston/Reservoir Junior Sunday Football League. Four Greensborough under 13 sides, known as the Blues, the Blacks, the Golds and the Maroons, together with two Watsonia teams and one Montmorency team formed the Greensborough Midget League.

In 1968, the administration of Junior Football was handed over to the DVFL, and the competition commenced as we know it today, with senior teams fielding Under 13 and Under 15 sides.

In 2001, Greensborough Junior Football Club with 11 teams in Under 10's through to Under 17's relocated to Anthony Beale Reserve with 2 grounds and a state-of-the-art pavilion – the Premier Facility for the Diamond Valley League.

Girl's football was introduced to Greensborough Junior Football Club in 2015. In the first year there were 3 teams; Under 12, Under 15 and Under 18. A successful start with the Under 15's winning the Premiership. To date, we haven't been able to fill squads to field teams amongst the junior years, although have come extremely close. We are confident this will happen in the 2024 season.

6. Achievements & Objectives

A number of achievements and objectives for the 2023 season;

Achievements:

Building Refurbishment

The Club secured \$1.5 million from Banyule Council for a Club refurbishment. This was scheduled to be completed for the 2024 season, which would have nicely coincided with the club's 60th Anniversary. The refurbishment sub-committee were disappointed to learn that costs had come in at approximately \$1 million over our budget, hence the refurbishment has been pushed back 12 months and we now hope that we will have new rooms for the 2025 season. The upside of this is that Banyule Council has pledged to find the additional \$1 million required either via State or Federal Government funding.

Grants received

The Club was successful with the Jaga-Jaga 2022-23 Volunteer Grant, which has seen the Club purchase office equipment, including an A3 Printer and Laminator.

Kitchen makeover

A new sink, dishwasher and benchtop was installed by one of our members at cost price. This was badly needed and made the canteen staff's time so much easier on game day.

Toyota Good for Footy raffle

Once again the Club participated in the Good for Footy raffle, which helps fund projects needed to keep the club ticking along. At the time of writing the raffle was not closed and we had raised \$1570, which will go into the coffers for the 2024 season.

Club structure

An external company was engaged to help oversee the restructure of club roles in an endeavour to streamline the running of the club and make things more efficient. People can now volunteer for a single role - for example Club History - without being obliged to take a committee role and attend meetings. This should result in more people volunteering smaller portions of time to the Club whilst still making a valued contribution.

Headspace

Our members and supporters raised \$2000 for local not-for-profit organisation headspace, which provides services and mental support for local youths. I hope that this is an ongoing partnership.

Diamond Valley Lions

The Club donated \$500 to the Diamond Valley Lions Club in recognition of the work provided by their volunteers who cooked a barbecue for our members over the course of Registration Day and Presentation Day.

Mission Statement and Values:

During the course of this year, we took the opportunity to refresh our Mission Statement, Vision Statement and Club Values. These are all important tools to guide the decisions we make and ensure everyone is pulling in the same direction.

We achieved this with the help of Clubmap, a company that specialises in helping sports clubs make the most of the volunteer resources they have available.

A **mission statement** is a concise description of the organisation's key fundamental purpose. Going forward, our mission statement will be:

To build the Diamond Valley's most inclusive and supportive community sporting club.

A **vision statement** is a big-picture statement that looks to the future of the club. It should focus on the long term. Going forward, our mission statement will be:

To establish ourselves as a destination sporting club by creating an unrivalled culture built on development, support and commitment to players, members and community alike.

At the same time, we took the opportunity to refresh our club values. These are the common language we share that helps us form our decisions and influence our behaviour.

Objectives:

Indigenous jumper

Plans are underway for the design and manufacturing of our inaugural Indigenous jumper. A sub-committee will be formed during the off-season consisting of committee members and team leaders who consult with an Indigenous artist and will oversee the design of our jumper. Our apparel sponsor is confident that we will have the jumper ready for the 2024 season.

Fixed Seating

As we are a Junior Football Club we have a number of grandparents in attendance who enjoy watching their grandchildren play. It would be ideal if fixed seating could be installed so committee members don't have to put seating out at every game and spectators don't have to bring their own chairs. There is no reason why the area between the gravel path and retaining wall on the bottom oval could not become a bank of seating.

Goal Net

The cost of a net behind the goals at the north end of the bottom oval is extensive, going by a Council quote, however a net should be installed to stop footballs from going down the hill and a deliberate tactic of time wasting being employed to stop opposing teams winning a game.

Scoreboard

A new scoreboard has been on the club's radar for a number of years. In the last 12 months, we have taken significant steps forward and, at this point, we expect to have a new scoreboard in place by the start of the 2024 season.

The plan is to implement a 4m by 2m LED screen to replace the existing scoreboard on the bottom oval. We have a quote and are just finalising the installation cost and waiting for council approval. Once that happens, we will place the order.

Rather than being a sunk cost that we depreciate over time, the new scoreboard will be a working asset. We will be able to use it for promotion and community purposes (e.g., movie nights) and also to generate additional revenue for the club.

Thanks to a sizeable donation from the Greensborough RSL, we believe we will be able to achieve a return on investment within four years.

Joe Murphy Trophy

Joe Murphy came to Greensborough from Fitzroy in 1954 as Captain-Coach and won the first of 2 DVFL Best & Fairest awards in that year.

From 1955-1958, he was Captain-Coach of the La Trobe Football Club in the NWFU in Tasmania. He represented Tasmania in the State Carnivals and won the All Australian selection. Returning to Greensborough in 1959 to set up his legal business, he was Captain-Coach of the 1960 and 1961 premiership sides, and won his second DVFL Best and Fairest award in 1961. Many observers regard Joe Murphy as the best player ever to play DVFL football. Following various positions on the Greensborough committee, Joe was Club President from 1966-1968 and was the instigator of Junior Football in the area.

Everybody connected with the DVFL was saddened by the passing of Joe at a comparatively young age on June 7, 1985 from a terminal illness. In 1986, as a tribute to the vision of Joe Murphy, the Greensborough Junior Football Club created a perpetual award known as the Joe Murphy Trophy. It is awarded annually to the junior footballer that the committee considers the most outstanding for that year. A shield is displayed in the clubrooms, and the awarded player is presented with a trophy on Presentation day.

The trophy reads "Awarded to the player who embraces & represents the Club's values and the spirit of Club founder Joe Murphy"

Stephen Hatfield Award (U17.5 B & F)

Stephen Hatfield was a long-standing club member and a dedicated club volunteer during the 1990's. In speaking with previous members of the club, they mentioned the variety of contributions and hands on roles he performed around the club as a parent volunteer, and described him in the highest terms of his grassroots involvement.

Stephen was the Team Trainer for the 1996 GJFC U15 Premiership team, for which the flag and team photo hang proudly in the clubrooms.

Tragically just a year later in August 1997, Stephen was killed in a light plane crash in the Northern Territory. The Cessna with 5 people onboard was on a chartered sightseeing flight from Darwin to Katherine. However due to pilot miscalculation, the plane ran out of fuel and crashed just 6km short of Katherine airport, killing all onboard. Stephen left behind a wife and 4 children. In his memory, the GJFC created the Stephen Hatfield Memorial Trophy, and since 1997 this has been awarded to the U17 Boys B&F player. The 2023 B&F winner will also be inscribed on this trophy and help to maintain Stephen's legacy.

9. Presidents Report

Another season has come to a close. It was relatively smooth, with a few curve balls thrown in, which is to be expected. The administration side of the Club really kicks into gear in February, when there is plenty of planning to be done for the upcoming season. It is a rarity that between that time and the end of August that you have a day off from club matters. At times it can be daunting and unrelenting, yet it continually satisfies when you can see the end result of your work.

Overall, most tasks that we set out to achieve were completed. On the flip side I was disappointed that Banyule Council reneged on their \$1.5 million pledge to upgrade the clubrooms, a project that has now been pushed back 12 months to allow for additional funding to be secured. It would have been ideal to have had the official opening of the new rooms coinciding with our 60th Anniversary but it wasn't to be.

Greensborough RSL donated money five years ago to fund a new scoreboard. The donation covers approximately two thirds of the cost and the Club will cover the remainder. This has been delayed due to the Covid-19 pandemic and now it needs to wait until we have new clubrooms or we face paying for the trenches and electrical work twice.

Much has been achieved in my three years at the helm;

- The Club has been re-structured to a better, more efficient business model. The committee that I inherited had many people on it with their own agendas. It was toxic and they were weeded out within the first 18 months. Now the committee is unified and the place runs smoothly.
- Teams have grown to 14 with 310 players along with 176 registered to the Glen Katherine Auskick program, which is run at Anthony Beale.
- We are financial, with enough money in the bank to cover some new projects, whilst continuing to run the Club at a profit.
- Our sponsorship base is strong and the sponsors remain loyal to the Club. The medium-term future of the Club is secure.

The greatest disappointment in this time is the failure to establish a girls' team. We were only a couple of players shy from getting two teams up and running this season until one of our own members decided to send a friendship group to another Club and the entire summer of planning fell over. Banyule Council has data that shows a dip in girls' participation in team sport of all codes since the Covid-19 pandemic so if you don't already have an established girls' team you have a fight on your hands to form a side.

Recommendations -

- The Club moves from the outdated Outlook email to something more secure such as Gmail. We have been hacked twice in two years with the scammers becoming better at what they are doing.
- Committee members embrace the implementation of TidyHQ, which will streamline the running of the Club.
- Committee members need to be rostered to assist with match day set up, pack up and the match day manager role. It can't be expected to be left to the executive each week.
- More parents from the younger age groups are targeted to join the committee.
- Somebody volunteers to make the establishment of a girls team their project. It needs plenty of time devoted to it.
- More emphasis is placed on the mental health and wellbeing of our members. Our Club Chaplain Greg Shambrook is always more than happy to speak to anyone who may be struggling. Our players could utilise the services of our not for profit partner headspace Greensborough.

• We maintain a strong relationship with the GFC. The relationship must work both ways so we need to ensure that they are meeting our requests such as mandatory attendance at On the Couch, joint training sessions and more.

Appreciation -

Until anyone walks in our shoes I believe nobody has any comprehension of the amount of work that the Executive does. All executive members have a tireless work ethic and are driven by one common motivator - to ensure our kids have a good environment to enjoy and play their football.

Vice President Marc Vangelista has been my wingman for the past three years and has been a rock of support for me. Marc this year has marked the grounds, completed match day set up and pack up, is on the refurbishment sub-committee plus attended Clubroom refurbishment meetings with Council and architects as well as his on-field roles as Under 14 coach and Under 19 assistant coach.

Secretary Carly Walsh came on board in April last year and with no handover done had to find her feet quickly. Carly is efficient and gets the job done with no fuss, communicating with various stakeholders at all times of the day and night, whenever there is spare time really. I needed somebody dependable who could step into the role and I haven't had to stress because I knew that Carly would get the job done. Carly is also Under 12 Team Manager, works during the day and runs the family home so I'm amazed that she found the time to help out. I will be forever grateful for what Carly has contributed to the Club.

Treasurer Kerriann Sigley is arguably the busiest person I know. Treasury takes considerable time to stay on top of and before the season begins Kerriann is also our Registrations Officer. Not only that, Kerriann has paid employment plus assists in helping run a family business as well as keeping the Sigley family in line. Kerriann was awarded Life Membership of the GJFC this season and nobody was more deserving of this award.

Football Director Brett Cook joined the executive this year and eased into this role with minimum fuss. Pre-season Brett took coaching applications and appointed all of the coaches then had to arrange training times for all 14 teams. On top of this we had requests from the Women's, Men's and Under 19s to use Anthony Beale for some pre-season dates. This is logistically a nightmare and somehow Brett was able to keep all parties pleased. We had a number of first-time coaches so education and communication was the key, both of which are Brett's strong suits.

Assistant Secretary Kate Bonazza took minutes at committee meetings and distributed them promptly to ensure that action items were being followed up.

Assistant Treasurer Melissa Halley processed payments with Kerriann and ensured that all bills were paid on time. Pauline Lavendar lent her expertise to Kerriann and Melissa behind the scenes.

Stuart Lavendar was in charge of sponsorship again and encouraged a record number of sponsors to come on board and support the GJFC. Stuart has played a big part in ensuring the Club has recorded a healthy profit in each of the past three seasons. Stuart was always available to lend a hand with anything that was required to be done around the Club.

Melinda Munro organised prizes and made them into packs to be raffled at On the Couch as well as arranging the club trophies and updating of honour boards.

Simon Harding was our Council Liaison, which took up a lot of time, as well as refurbishment sub-committee and member of the 60th Anniversary sub-committee, which have met a number of times to get things underway for next season.

First time committee member Nadine McClintock took on the merchandise role, ensuring that orders were processed and merchandise was distributed and sold in an efficient timeframe.

Ari Bitzilis joined the committee and was our Communications Manager. Ari kept and families and supporters up to date with news and information from the club via email and our various social media platforms.

Scott Devers was our Team Manager Co-Ordinator and ensured that information from committee meetings was distributed to the Team Managers clearly. Scott was also our Glen Katherine Auskick Liaison and ensured that the lines of communication between both parties were clear.

Nicola Harwood ran a tight ship as Canteen Manager, keeping track of stock levels, match day staff rostering - even enlisting her Mum to help on multiple days! Thanks for all of your hard work over the past two seasons.

Marie Bonanno looked after our first aid kits, ensuring all of the stock wasn't out of date and ordering new stock when required.

Craig Dimech once again marked the grounds. This is a big task, especially when both ovals are marked for the first time.

Anthony Gasparini, Kaine Plummer and Dean Howitt were always available to lend a hand with anything that was required to be done around the Club.

Jodie Hogg and Nicole Phillips cleaned the clubrooms and they were always spotless at the beginning of a new week.

All of the players should be proud of how they carry themselves and represent the GJFC. Whilst grand final day was disappointing when we didn't record any wins, everyone took it on the chin, accepted it and moved on, which is something I cannot say about some of our rival Clubs who are hellbent on premierships, regardless of the fallout from those on the outskirts of teams who are not perceived to be "up to it". This is what separates us from the rest and that's what I like most about our Club, that we give everyone a go, no matter what their ability level is. I hope this doesn't change.

Thanks -

It goes without saying that I couldn't do this job without the love and support of my wife Lauren as well as Liam and Darcy. Thanks for your understanding over the past three years as to why I have been absent so often, especially after hours and on Sundays. You haven't seen much of me during football season because of my Club

commitments but it was something that I was passionate about and I have achieved most of what I set out to do.

I had the honour of being awarded a Life Membership of the GJFC. Whilst this is a nice acknowledgement of my contribution to the Club, I didn't join the committee for personal accolades, I joined to give my boys a good environment to play in at a great Club.

I have been proud to tell anyone that I am President over the past three seasons and the positives of the job far outweigh the negatives. This season I didn't have any trouble from any of our 310 players and that is something that they should be proud of. I really enjoyed the interaction with players from all age groups who were always keen to tell me how their game went. Plenty were comfortable enough to tell me without being asked and I loved that.

I think the mark of any job is leaving it in a better position than you found it. I think that I have done that and now hand it over to the next person who is up for the challenge. Up the Boro!

11. Football Director/Coach Coordinator Report

2023 started with the process of producing a Team Selection Policy, in previous years there had not been any official mechanism to move players from one team to another in a particular age group. Although the policy was completed and in place well before the season started, the policy was not activated due to communicating and working with the coaches of those age groups where we had multiple teams, we came to a mutual agreeance of final squads. I believe in 2024, the policy will be activated and obviously can be reviewed at the end of that season to and make decisions accordingly for future years.

Player numbers at the club were 300 plus with 4×19 , 2×110 , 2×111 , 1×112 , 2×113 , 1×114 , 1×115 and 1×117 teams. In a couple of those age groups, notably 110 and 111, the numbers were on the light side and we will need to attract more players next year to ensure we can field two teams in each (111 and 112 for season 2024). On the flip side some other age groups had an abundance of players meaning rostering players to miss games – it would be great if we could increase numbers in those age groups to be able register another team so all players can play every week.

The NFNL changed the grading process to provisional grading in 2023 which meant all teams played grading games in one division and adjustments were made after the grading period finished. For a number of our age groups, the league grading both in the provisional stage and after grading games were completed didn't quite hit the mark. Two of our U9 teams and one of our U11 teams found themselves in divisions higher than the current development level of the players in those teams presenting challenges for the coaches due to a number of heavy defeats. The coaches of these teams did a terrific job in keeping the morale of the players up and did their best to keep the season enjoyable whilst still ensuring each group developed during the year.

Due to their success from season 2022, our 2023 U12 and U14 teams also progressed into higher divisions and although they found the going tough in the early part of the season, both of these teams developed and improved their competitiveness significantly to notch a number of wins in the back half of the season – the future looks bright for both of these age groups.

Our U11 Green, both U13 teams, U15 and U17 all progressed into finals with U11, U15 and U17 all making it into Grand Finals. However, unfortunately no premiers for GJFC in 2023. Although we'd obviously like to add to premierships to the club's tally, it's still a significant achievement for any team to make it into a GF – it shows our player development is on the right track.

Hats off to all our coaches and assistant coaches for their time and effort for season 2023, I feel they all have done a fantastic job from a football development point of view while providing an enjoyable environment for players of all age groups.

In season 2024 I would like to see more scope for coach development to help our coaches deliver the best possible environment for all of our players to thrive and grow. The club also needs to start advertising for players, especially girls as soon as possible to ensure the GJFC continues to provide opportunities for as many children as possible to play this great game.

I hope all the boys enjoyed their season and developed both as players and young men. They play the game hard, but fair. They are also respectful, which is the Boro values.

The season

We managed to finish with a regular season record of 11-3. The three games we lost were: round 4 to Eltham Black by 17 points, round 8 to Eltham Red by 8 points, round 12 to Yarrambat Brown by 32 points.

We also managed to beat all of those teams during the season. We avenged our round 4 loss to Eltham Black in round 11, beating them by 16 points. We avenged the loss to Eltham Red by beating them in the Prelim final by 6 points! We had beaten Yarrambat Brown by 1 point earlier in the season in round 5, an absolute thriller on Mother's Day at home. Beating every team in the competition shows how talented our group is, and that they definitely deserved to make the Grand Final in the top division – NFNL U11 Blue division. All the boys should be extremely proud of their effort and their season, because the coaching staff certainly is!

We had some team rules for the season. We concentrated on not kicking across goal in our backline, unless someone was clear by a country mile. The second rule was to quickly get back off the mark, and look for a switch. The third rule was when the ball is in dispute, get numbers to the ball. Once we win the ball, protect the ball carrier and lengthen & widen – get to space. I think they did a great job of playing to these rules.

When we talk about success as a team, it isn't all about the results and finals. I take great pride in the development I have seen in many areas, including skill, hardness at the ball, footy IQ, down to being in the right spot in a zone. The boys have come a long way.

Going back to the improvement piece... I look at our performance against Eltham Red when they beat us at home in round 8. They beat us 3.4.22 to 2.2.14. Even though it was only 8 points, they beat us all over the ground, especially in the second half. When you compare their performance in that game to what they brought in the Prelim final...that is the improvement I speak of. We beat them in the prelim 4.4.28 to 3.4.22. It is how they won that game that shows their improvement as a team. Defence held up time and time again. The mids lifted and ran the game out really well. We used the ball wisely – lowering the eyes and using the 'fat side' of the ground rather than bombing it in. They finished the game stronger, and looked like the team that would win. Confidence coupled with their skill and their want to win. That is the difference from start to finish of the season for this team. Development as players and in maturity as a team.

Finals

<u>Semi</u> - We finished third on the ladder and played Yarrambat Gold in the 3 v 4. The game was at Mernda which is a very big ground for U11's. We dominated the game from start to finish, beating them 8.6.54 to 0.3.3.

<u>Prelim</u> – Yarrambat Brown finished top and won straight through to the GF. We faced Eltham Red who finished 2nd, and had beaten us in our only clash earlier in the season. The boys were pumped and really came out to play. It was a bit of an arm wrestle, but they held their nerve and were the better team on the day coming away with the 4.4.28 to 3.4.22 win. They thoroughly deserved to make the GF.

<u>Grand Final</u> – Yarrambat Brown were the best side all year. Although we beat them by a point in round 5, they tore us apart in round 12 to beat us 8.9.57 to 4.1.25. We did not hit the scoreboard until the 3rd quarter, so knew it was going to be a tough encounter in the GF. Unfortunately, we didn't turn up on the day. The much bigger southern oval at Mernda also did not work in our favour. Yarrambat were everywhere and we had no answer for them, going down 3.11.29 to our 0.2.2. It was a disappointing end to the season, but as I mentioned, it was an extremely good effort to make the GF in the top division.

Noting our team strength is 22, in the semi-final we played with 24 players. In the prelim and grand final, we had 23 players (only 1 extra). For comparison, the opposition fielded 27 players in the GF. For our boys to make it that far, with depleted numbers, is a great effort.

Some stats for the year:

Our greatest winning margin was against Whittlesea where we beat them 68-0 in round 2. Our highest score was against Monty in round 14 when we kicked 10.12.72 to their 3.8.26. 13 of our listed 22 players played in every game. 9 different players were awarded the team best on ground. 17 out of our 22 listed players kicked a goal during the season. This is a really good indication of how balanced our team is when moving players around position wise.

Our preseason started late November last year with a focus of improving our skill set. I always stress to our group that simply showing up to training and kicking the footy a few times won't be of great benefit to improving. School holidays passed quickly and by late January we were back at training. As 11- and 12-year-old boys I can say as a group we would generally switch on and focus on the drills provided. Being that the majority of last year's team had returned we weren't required to go through the expectations that the coaching group place on the group. With that, our "experienced" group welcomed our first crop of new players EJ, Will G and Zach to the group.

After training enthusiastically through February and March early April was to be our first game. After the success of our Under 11 year, we knew we were going to be challenged by stronger, talented and very competitive teams. At this point with 25 players on our list we knew the juggle we had ahead. Then practically on the eve of the season starting we had another 3 players enquire on the possibility of joining our squad. After a few restless nights and many conversations with our coaching team we could see only positive outcomes for accepting Parker, Jimmy and Aiden into our group.

Having 28 players meant we needed to roster off 4 players each week along with having 6 players on the bench. This presents so many challenges to not only the coaching group but also to the players. Boys don't want to be missing out on games, they also don't want to be sitting on the bench missing out on game time. I firmly believe the players learning comes from being out on the ground competing, and I think our results early in the season showed this as being a challenge. To the players credit they all accepted that this is what we will have for the season, and the importance of being part of a team far outweighs any personal wants or needs. At no point through the season was I personally questioned by a single parent regarding their son's game time, and only once was I approached by a player requesting more ground time, credit to both parents and players for accepting our predicament and understanding our 'team first' approach.

The season was challenging, as it should be moving up a division. At the halfway point of the season and not having sung our theme song after 7 games, we needed to keep the group positive. And to their credit they never wavered from the want and desire of competing. Pleasingly round 8 saw our first win of the year quickly followed up in round 10 by beating last year's premiers of this division by 2 points. This was the fourth time we had played Yarrambat over the last 2 years, and they had beaten us by 80, 49 and 23 points, so this win was extremely special. If we were to measure growth simply by margins, then this would provide a positive outcome. Another 2 wins over Whittlesea and Mernda in the last round meant we had turned a 0 from 7 start to the season to a 4 from 7 in the last half. Preparations for the 2023 season kicked off in November 2022 with four weeks of open training sessions for the entire under 13 age group at St Helena College. This provided an excellent opportunity for players that were available to join their team mates for a kick and a catch up before Christmas. Attendance and enthusiasm were high, and each training session included a combination of fitness and motor skill activities, ball handling drills and games, with the training block concluding with pizza and drinks to celebrate the end of the year.

The official kick off to the pre-season began in late January and during the early part of the year, we had to make the most of every opportunity to train due to uncertainty around ground availability. Not to be deterred, many of the boys took the opportunity to build on their fitness and ball skills as the season fast approached.

With a single practice match planned against Yarrambat, we approached St Marys JFC in an attempt to secure a second game and fortunately, they were able to accommodate our request and our first official practice match took place at Greensborough College on a perfect Sunday morning. The performance of the team during this practice game generated real excitement for the team for the season ahead with great ball movement and team work on display.

As the commencement of the season approached, we collectively formulated a set of values that would guide our behaviours both on and off the field.

Effort, Persistence, Respect and Camaraderie

The boys had already begun to create a team culture amongst themselves with the rallying call of "What are we?... Family", which would be used throughout the year at the conclusion of training sessions or before taking the field.

Our goal setting for the year, focused around breaking the season into blocks. Grading Games Regular Season Round 5-9 Regular Season Round 10-14 Finals

The aim was to first win enough grading games to secure a position in the Blue division and in each of the regular season blocks win enough games to secure a finals position. As we progressed through the season, the result of each block would help us set or re-adjust our goals in subsequent blocks based on how the season was travelling.

After a successful preseason period, we entered the grading phase of the year prepared for a positive start, subsequently winning each of our four grading games, including a win against eventual premiers, Montmorency and a breakthrough win against Yarrambat.

The good form continued in rounds 5-8 with hard fought wins against South Morang and Montmorency. The result of these games in particular highlighting the team's never give in attitude and desire to find a way to win despite strong play from opposition teams.

Our first loss for the season came in Round 9 when we faced Yarrambat at their home ground. Although the final score was not what we had hoped, the game provided a great learning opportunity for the team and helped spark a renewed focus on the style of play and pattern of ball movement required to compete with many of the physically larger opposition sides.

The final block of the regular season, (rounds 10-14) saw the team challenged with injuries, illness, unavailability of players and form fluctuations. As expected with sporting teams, particularly those during the development phases, the consistency of output from the team is bound to be variable over the course of the season. This period saw an unexpected loss to Eltham, a dominant performance against South Morang and a hard-fought loss against Montmorency over the space of three rounds.

The terrific start to the season meant that despite the unexpected loss to Eltham, we entered the 14th and final round of the home and away season knowing that with a victory, the team could still finish second on the ladder and earn a double chance during the finals. Facing Yarrambat, with the winner to finish second, the boys gave it their all for the entire four quarters. Leading by 3 points, with the ball in Yarrambat's forward half and under 30 seconds remaining, an unlucky 25m penalty allowed Yarrambat a come from behind victory. Despite the loss, we highlighted that sometimes you can do everything right and not get the result you desired. The game served to reinforce a sense of belief amongst the team that we could beat any team in the competition if our effort and game style was executed to its best.

Finishing third at the conclusion of the home and away season, we were fixtured to play Eltham in the 1st Semi Final. A victory would see us progress to the preliminary final the following week. Training over the preceding months had focussed on a number of key aspects. Win the ball and break away from congestion with handball, look to switch the ball at every opportunity and move the ball fast and to space, honouring the loose or leading player.

In the 1st Semi Final, the boys executed this style of play to near perfection with the team dominating field play and setting up many opportunities to score, winning by a margin of 52

points. During the preliminary final the following week against Yarrambat, the result unfortunately went the other way. Yarrambat took advantage of their size advantage around the ground to dominate the contested ball and field position.
